The general meeting on the 6<sup>th</sup> was concluded with a Christmas party when members brought toys for the Toys For Tots Program.


Friday, the 9<sup>th</sup>, was the graduation of the Young Marines at the Folsom, VFW #928.

AT THE ELEVENTH HOUR



Donald J. Yarmy...a.k.a. Don Adams

Don Adams, a wounded WWII Veteran, drill instructor and wry-voice comedian who starred as the fumbling secret agent Maxwell Smart in the 1960's TV series "Get Smart", which was a spoof of James Bond movies – died, September 25, 2005, of a lung infection in Los Angeles. He was 82. Adams was a 16-year-old, 120 pound, high school dropout who lied about his age and enlisted in the Corps during WWII. He was sent to Samoa and later fought on Guadalcanal, where he was wounded. He contracted the deadly blackwater fever and spent nearly three years in military hospitals. He returned to the States and spent several years as a drill instructor where he claimed to have acquired the clipped delivery that served him well as a comedian.

He portrayed the inept Agent 86, and his quips such as "Would you believe...?" and "Sorry about that, Chief" entered the American lexicon.

## Lessons from the Pennsylvania Veterans Museum: *a sampling of the history of WWII currently on display*

### Navajo Code Talkers

The language of the Navajo Indians is so unusual that it was used during World War II to encode secret messages. Marine commanders recruited about 200 Native Navajo speakers to send and receive these messages. The Navajo code talkers were so successful that the Marines came to depend on their skills. At Iwo Jima the code talkers were one of the keys to victory. The Japanese were never able to break the code.

### The Army That Never Was

Secret plans for D-Day were the responsibility of American Supreme Commander General Dwight Eisenhower and British General Bernard Montgomery. To make sure the secret was safe from the Germans, the Allies built a fake army out of cardboard, wood and rubber. Jasper Maskelyne, a British magician, was in charge of creating the make-believe "First Army." The ruse fooled the Germans, who didn't expect the D-Day invasion when it came.

## **Duty, Honor, Country: The Pennsylvania Veterans Museum Opens in Media**

Valor, patriotism, courage and sacrifice now have a home in Delaware County.

The Pennsylvania Veterans Museum on East State Street in Media opened its doors to the public on Veterans Day, 2005. Located in the old Media Armory (Trader Joe's is the neighbor upstairs), the museum reflects the efforts of concerned individuals to preserve the legacy and dignity of all U.S. military veterans in Pennsylvania by presenting a living history of their service experiences. No state has paid more in patriot's blood than Pennsylvania. The numbers of Pennsylvanians who have fought in recent wars is staggering: 1.2 million in World War II; 300,000 in Korea, 400,000 in Vietnam and 40,000 and climbing in the two Gulf Wars.

"Their history is but a part of the rich, military heritage that is uniquely Pennsylvania, but it is also one that is slowly slipping away that could be lost with time and the ravages of age," explains Bob McMahon, mayor of Media and one of the 1.2 million men and women who served in uniform currently residing in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. "That is both the reason for and the mission of the Pennsylvania Veterans Museum. To preserve for our children the true meaning of service and sacrifice."

The museum's inaugural exhibit – *Through Warrior's Eyes: An In-Depth Personal Look into World War II* – strives to bring history into the present day and enables older generations to pause and remember while younger students literally see, hear and feel the past as memories come to life. The entire museum challenges a visitor to recall – or imagine – a time when live video footage of war wasn't readily available on any number of cable channels. A time when every American – not just those in uniform – considered themselves warriors and patriots united in a common cause. A time when citizens around the globe sat glued to their radios every night awaiting news of world events. A time when it truly seemed the fate of the world depended on the courage of the military and the strength of those back home.

"The Pennsylvania Veterans Museum – a unique idea and concept – is designed to, for the first time, create a living, interactive understanding of who the veteran is, what the veteran did and why the veteran and their actions of the past are so important to the lives of the young people in the future," says Congressman Curt Weldon. "Textbooks serve a purpose but it's not the same thing. It's not the kind of deep, personal understanding that would be allowed if in fact we had that same student interact with a veteran who was a soldier on the front lines or a sailor on one of the ships or a parachutist who jumped out one of the planes on D-Day. That experiential learning is the most real way to motivate children."

Joseph A. Galli, superintendent of schools for the Upper Darby School District, agrees.

"When students have an opportunity to actually see and feel the kinds of things that existed during the time of war, it makes it a much more personal relationship for them," he says. "When you give a student an opportunity to stand in front of a kiosk and make personal choices as to exactly what they would like to learn about, it makes the learning that much more personal."

Exhibits throughout the museum hall include mannequins dressed in full uniforms of the time; military artifacts such as weaponry, maps and foreign language phrase books; letters and personal correspondence from soldiers; newspapers and medals. There are displays recognizing the roles of each branch of the service as well as key political figures of the war, paratroopers, the Tuskegee Airmen, the women who served in uniform and the situation on the home front. Throughout the displays, guests have several opportunities to pause in front of a touch-screen computer system to choose a personal story to listen to. Hearing a veteran's personal account of history while standing in front of a life size diorama depicting the scenes of war certainly has a vivid and dramatic impact on one's understanding of the past.

Guests can also view short movies about the war in the museum's Ruptured Duck Theater Film Festival and browse through books in the small gift shop. As Mayor McMahon explains, these exhibits are only the first round for this ambitious museum. There is much expansion and many future projects on the way including lessons plans for grades 5 through 11 available for use by all 501 school districts in Pennsylvania; a Band of Brothers documentary commissioned exclusively for the museum and an accompanying exhibit; an educational film about the Tuskegee Airmen based on the stories of Luther H. Smith, a sense surround theater that will combine archival footage, surround sound, theatrical lighting and special effects; and rotating exhibits on other military conflicts such the Korean, Vietnam and Gulf Wars as well.


