"OUR FLAG"

Do you know that at military funerals, the 21 gun salute stands for the sum of the numbers in the year 1776?

Have you ever noticed the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the American flag 13 times?

You probably thought it was to symbolize the original 13 colonies, but we learn something new every day!

The 1st fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The 2nd fold is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.

The 3rd fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing our ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.

The 4th fold represents our weaker nature, for as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war for His divine guidance.

The 5th fold is a tribute to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right; but it is still our country, right or wrong.

The 6th fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

The 7th fold is a tribute to our Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that we protect our country and our flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of our republic.

The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood, and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The 10th fold is a tribute to the father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since they were first born.

The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrews' eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christians' eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit.

The 13th fold, or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are upper most reminding us of our nation's motto, "In God We Trust."

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the Sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for us the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy today. There are some traditions and ways of doing things that have deep meaning.

THE ORIGINS OF VETERANS DAY

In 1921, an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. This site, on a hillside overlooking the Potomac River and the city of Washington, became the focal point of reverence for America's veterans.

Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an unknown soldier was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe). These memorial gestures all took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I fighting at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The day became known as "Armistice Day."

Armistice Day officially received its name in America in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later by similar Congressional action. If the idealistic hope had been realized that World War I was "the War to end all wars," November 11 might still be called Armistice Day. But only a few years after the holiday was proclaimed, war broke out in Europe. Sixteen and one-half million Americans took part. Four hundred seven thousand of them died in service, more than 292,000 in battle.

Armistice Day Changed To Honor All Veterans

An answer to the question of how to pay tribute to those who had served in this latest, great war came in a proposal made by Representative Edwin K. Rees of Kansas: Change Armistice Day to Veterans Day, and make it an occasion to honor those who have served America in all wars. In 1954 President Eisenhower signed a bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day.

On Memorial Day 1958, two more unidentified American war dead were brought from overseas and interred in the plaza beside the unknown soldier of World War I. One was killed in World War II, the other in the Korean War. In 1973, a law passed providing interment of an unknown American from the Vietnam War, but none was found for several years. In 1984, an unknown serviceman from that conflict was placed alongside the others. To honor these

men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army honor guard, The 3d U.S. Infantry (The Old Guard), keeps day and night vigil.

A law passed in 1968 changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a date of historic significance to many Americans. Therefore, in 1978 Congress returned the observance to its traditional date.

National Ceremonies Held at Arlington

The focal point for official, national ceremonies for Veterans Day continues to be the memorial amphitheater built around the Tomb of the Unknowns. At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard representing all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute to its war dead is symbolized by the laying of a presidential wreath. The bugler plays "taps." The rest of the ceremony takes place in the amphitheater.

Veterans Day ceremonies at Arlington and elsewhere are coordinated by the President's Veterans Day National Committee. Chaired by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, the committee represents national veterans' organizations.

Governors of states and U.S. territories appoint Veterans Day chairpersons who, in cooperation with the National Committee and the Department of Defense, arrange and promote local ceremonies.



The Legend Continues...

General Butler began a lecture tour after his retirement. He once spoke in twenty towns in twenty-one days. The core of his speeches centered on the hope of improving society and Americans' moral obligation in the fight against crime. He also became an advocate for peace and stated that he was a pacifist and that Americans should look after themselves. In 1935, his book, "War is a Racket", was published in which he stated, "In war, huge fortunes are made and used by few, and soldiers must pay for war with their lives. It would be cheaper for the United States to remain isolationist and stay out of war. The soldiers receive low pay to leave home, eat rations, sleep in trenches, kill and get killed. In the old days the soldiers received war spoils, but now the politicians receive the spoils."

It was also during this time that he became embroiled in a plot to take over the power of the government. Rich and powerful people sent their agents to see if Butler would take part in a move to seize power in Washington. He kept a record of the affair and it was duly investigated by Congress but nothing ever developed from the investigation.

The plan was based on the political situation in Italy and Germany. Benito Mussolini had taken control of Italy in 1922 via the Fascist Party (Black Shirts) even though King Vittorio Emanuele III was the titular head of government. Adolf Hitler took control of government in Germany via the National Socialist Party (Nazi Brown Shirts) on 30 January 1933 by being appointed Chancellor even though Fieldmarshal Paul Von Hindenburg was President of the Republic. The American plan was for the new Liberty Party (Khaki Shirts), composed mostly of veterans, to seize the power in Washington with Smedley Butler as Director and President Franklin Roosevelt as titular head of government.

THE BONUS EXPEDITIONARY FORCE

Thursday, 28th July 1932

Shortly after 11:00 a.m., General Glassford arrived and announced that he had orders to clear the buildings and the area of the B.E.F. people. Slow at first, with little resistance, by noon the first building was cleared. Meantime word of what was happening reached the B.E.F. main camp on Anacostia Flats and reinforcements were on their way. The arriving reinforcements started to engage the police and a melee ensued with fragments of bricks being hurled and Glassford, himself, was struck and knocked down and was horrified to see his police draw weapons and open fire into the crowd. One vet was shot dead, another mortally wounded and another shot before Glassford could order a cease-fire. Word of the melee and the shootings went to the White House and Attorney General Mitchell ordered the evacuation of all veterans from government property and when President Hoover learned of the shootings, he ordered the Secretary of War, Patrick Hurley, to use troops to carry out that order and General MacArthur was notified.

There was an embarrassing lull because MacArthur was not in full uniform. He dispatched an orderly to fetch his tunic, service decorations, sharpshooter medal and English whipcord breeches. Eisenhower didn't think that the Chief of Staff should become involved in "this street-corner brawl" but MacArthur was determined to take command because of this revolution at hand. MacArthur, then, ordered Eisenhower into uniform with the announcement, "We're going to break the back of the B.E.F."

When they arrived near the action in the staff car, there was another wait. "What's holding us up?" "The tanks," MacArthur replied. He intended to use tanks! A few moments later, people were watching a display of military force, which was arriving down Pennsylvania Avenue. Troopers of the 3^d Cavalry, led by Major Patton, pranced along brandishing naked sabers. Behind the horses marched a machine gun detachment and men of the 12th Infantry, 13th Engineers and 34th Infantry, the sun shining on their bayonets attached to their rifles and behind these were six tanks.

It was now 4:45 p.m. The operation had become the worst time in MacArthur's career. Fifteen minutes earlier, the District's civil service workers had finished work and were pouring into the streets; twenty thousand of them were massed on the sidewalks across from the bewildered, disorganized veterans. The veterans assuming that this display was a dress parade for their benefit, applauded. The spectators clapped, too, though they were the first to be disillusioned. Abruptly Patton's troops wheeled and charged into the crowd.

At first this was thought to be a mistake but this later was proven to be an ordered charge without warning into thousands of unoffending people; men and women were ridden down indiscriminately. Reforming ranks, they then charged the stunned vets and dispersed them the same way.


